Hereford Cathedral Visit:

Monday 29th May, and after an unusually circuitous coach journey from Melbourne another intrepid band of thirty-nine eager souls found ourselves once again in the lovely cathedral city of Hereford. After a beautiful preceding week of hot sunny weather the forecast had not been promising, nevertheless the weather gods smiled upon us once again and thankfully the threatened rain stayed away allowing for the usual round of coffee stops and sight-seeing interspersed with a modicum of modest retail therapy. Oh and of course a photo opportunity with the life-sized Hereford Bull bronze statue situated in the old market place. Hereford is yet another venue steeped in history and a garrison city forever associated with the famous SAS regiment of the British army. A few moments were spent crossing the river Wye to visit the small neighbouring parish church of St Martins located adjacent to the A438 and with historic links to The Regiment where a number of SAS troopers (including many from the Oman & Falklands conflicts of the 70s & 80s) are interred in a carefully tended private plot dedicated to the 22nd Air Service Regiment. A very pleasant lunch at a local hostelry preceded another beautiful Choral Evensong within the cathedral where the spectacular acoustic made the voices of the Melbourne Choir seem ever more resonant and angelic. A simply wonderful day out was enjoyed by all and we are looking forward to seeing more of you still at the next venue of the UK tour which will be taking place at Ripon Cathedral later in the month, see you there perhaps?

New Dean of Derby Cathedral announced:

Downing Street has announced that The Queen has approved the appointment of The Revd Canon Dr Stephen Hance as the next Dean of Derby. He succeeds The Very Revd John Davies as Dean, following his move to Wells Cathedral in 2016.

Dr Hance is to take up his position later in the year. He currently serves as Canon Missioner of Southwark Cathedral and Director of Mission and Evangelism for the Diocese of Southwark, a position that he has held since 2013. In this role, he has taken a lead on the outward-facing aspects of Southwark Cathedral's ministry and played a key role in developing diocesan mission strategy.

He will be bringing to Derby his years of experience promoting the mission of the Church and growing church congregations. During his time in Southwark he founded the Cathedrals and Growth Network which seeks to share good practice amongst cathedrals and enable them to grow in numbers, depth of faith and impact. He became a member of General Synod in 2015 and has published three books and contributed to others on Mission Action Planning, and sacraments and Fresh Expressions of church. He is currently editing a new book on forgiveness.

Stephen joins Derby Cathedral at an exciting period of change. A major building project to re-lead the nave roof is nearing completion, and follows the renewal of the Cathedral interior two years ago. Further plans for the building include the refurbishment of the unique Compton organ, the replacement of the fixed pews with moveable seating to make the building more accessible for services and events, and the use of digital technology to help visitors discover the historical and spiritual riches of the Cathedral. The project to open Derby Cathedral School, a new Church of England secondary

school for the city, is well under way. Stephen will be pivotal in all these important developments for the Cathedral and the city of Derby.

Following a degree in Sociology at Portsmouth University, Stephen trained at St John's Theological College, Nottingham before serving his curacy in the Diocese of Portsmouth. He went on to be Team Vicar in Finsbury Park, London and later joined Southwark Diocese in 1999 as Vicar of the Ascension, Balham Hill. During this time, he worked on various projects including the Just 10 South London Mission, The Maseno Project in Kenya and as Co-Host / Facilitator for The Global Leadership Summit in London.

Stephen is married to Jacqui and has three grown up children, Natalie, Simeon and Isaac. *(Taken from The Diocese of Derby website)*

And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you.
