

#### The Senior Citizens' Centre: One of our recipients of Sunday Teas Giving:

Run by a committee of willing volunteers, Melbourne Senior Citizens' Centre can be found on the corner of Church Street and Castle Street, a stone's throw from the Parish church. Home to a variety of local organisations such as the Inner Wheel, Melbourne's Wine Circle, and Melbourne Gardening Club, we also aim to promote health in the ageing population with groups such as T'ai Chi, Circuit Training (two ladies in their eighties are regular attendees), and of course bowling. We try to ease loneliness and isolation with coffee mornings, a monthly Musical Memories session, and the Thursday Activity Group ....where the housebound can be collected from their homes and enjoy coffee, lunch and chat.

In order to keep the Centre a pleasant environment for the user groups we have, over the last few years, updated the kitchen, the toilet facilities and the flooring. Our next project is to replace the curtains with more flexible window coverings. A programme of regular fundraising events continues to enable refurbishment and we are very grateful to the Parish Church for selecting the Centre to be one of the recipients of the money received from the Sunday Teas in 2017.

# The Readings at 8am and 10.30am:

## First Reading: Romans 6.12-end

Therefore, do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have

been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

## The Gospel Reading: Matthew 10.40-end

'Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward; and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous; and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward.'

## Processional Hymn at 10.30am:

O God, beyond all praising, we worship you today, and sing the love amazing that songs cannot repay; for we can only wonder at ev'ry gift you send, at blessings without number and mercies without end: we lift our hearts before you and wait upon your word, we honour and adore you, our great and mighty Lord.

Then hear, O gracious Saviour, accept the love we bring, that we who know your favour may serve you as our king; and whether our tomorrows be filled with good or ill, we'll triumph through our sorrows and rise to bless you still: to marvel at your beauty and glory in your ways, and make a joyful duty our sacrifice of praise.
