

A Feast of Choral Music Melbourne Parish Church

We're looking forward to another visit from South Derbyshire Choir, *Cantabile* on Sunday afternoon, 15th October. *Cantabile* have given many concerts in our church, and this time they are joining forces with Sutton Coldfield Choir *B Natural*.

The first half of the programme will be a performance of the very lovely Fauré's *Requiem*. Each choir will sing three pieces in the second half, ending with Parry's rousing anthem *I was glad*.

The conductors are Philip King and Richard Jeffries, and the organist is Tom Corfield.

We hope you'll join us for this feast of choral music. The programme starts at 3-30pm; there will be interval drinks; and the concert ends at 5-15pm.

Tickets are £8 (children £3), and are available at the door.

On Saturday 4th November, Professor Janet Spencer will speak to the Friends either side of a buffet lunch at The Dower House. We will gather at 12 noon for a 45 minute talk followed by lunch 1.00 – 1.45pm concluding with a further 45 minutes talk and discussion, the event finishing at 2.30pm. 'The Survival of Church Architecture'

In the 21st century our cathedrals and churches have never been better cared for. In this talk I will take us back to earlier times to ask questions about how attitudes to our medieval heritage have changed over the centuries. Why was it, for example, that by the end of the 18th century, many great buildings such as St Alban's Abbey, and Rochester and Hereford cathedrals were on the point of collapse and our beloved small parish churches were falling to ruin, described in such desperate terms by one vicar, as 'the church being overrun by dissent, the crumbling stone carried away by the cart-load for roadmending and the font in a field used as a cattle trough'. Some restoration was carried out in the 1700s, but what inspired the architect James Wyatt in the course of his reparations at Lichfield and Canterbury to sweep away much decorative work and demolish 14th and 15th century chantry chapels as 'excrecences'?

How did change happen and what was the context for the great revival movement that took place in the 19th century, leading to much rebuilding and restoration, not all of it the most sensitive kind. George Gilbert Scott worked at our own Norman church and we should be thankful that when funds were short he was constrained to do only what was necessary to keep the structure sound, unlike his work at the ancient St Alban's Abbey where,

as one contemporary observer noted, it stood 'transformed as a complete specimen of 19th century work'.

What of our own attitudes in the 20th and 21st century? We may shed tears throughout over some of the disasters, demolition and loss from previous ages, but we will hope to end on a positive note for the future survival of our magnificent church architecture.

Chorus Amici - in Concert.

This latest event hosted by the Friends turned out to be no ordinary concert. It was worthy of the finest concert halls or cathedrals in the land and stands out in my memory as one of those rare occasions when every minute was filled with something special. The "choir of friends" charmed us, thrilled us, entertained us, astonished us.

Their programme presented an eclectic international repertoire from Palestrina (1525-94) to Eriks Esenvalds (b.1977). Falling into a first half of sacred music, followed by secular items after the interval, most of the pieces and composers were unfamiliar to most of us. Far from being a weakness, this offered us a journey of musical discovery, brimming with fresh new sounds. There was an elegant poignancy about the harmonies of Scandinavian composers particularly represented in the programme reflecting the international travels of the choir. Performances were unanimously superb; the beautiful blend of tone, the astonishing range of dynamics, the authenticity of the changing moods, the energy and commitment of all twenty eight singers. There were numerous solo lines confirming a huge store of talent within.

The nub of the success of this choir, drawn from a wide geographical area, undoubtedly stems from the personality and skills of its conductor, Chris Mallinson. At the outset he declared his mission that "concerts of classical music should be unstuffy affairs". His jovial introductions to the pieces certainly achieved that, but his outstanding achievement was in the integrity of the performances and the sheer beauty of the sound created. The Readings at 8am and 10.30am:

First Reading: *Philippians* 4.1-9

Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved. I urge Euodia and I urge Syntyche to be of the same mind in the Lord. Yes, and I ask you also, my loyal companion, help these women, for they have struggled beside me in the work of the gospel, together with Clement and the rest of my co-workers, whose names are in the book of life. Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with

thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

The Gospel Reading: Matthew 22.1-14

Once more Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. Again he sent other slaves, saying, "Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet." But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his slaves, maltreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his slaves, "The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet." Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests. 'But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, and he said to him, "Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?" And he was speechless. Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." For many are called, but few are chosen.'

Additional Collect:

God, our judge and saviour, teach us to be open to your truth and to trust in your love, that we may live each day with confidence in the salvation which is given through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Recessional Hymn at 10.30am:

1 Church of God, elect and glorious, holy nation, chosen race; called as God's own special people, royal priests and heirs of grace: know the purpose of your calling, show to all his mighty deeds; tell of love which knows no limits, grace which meets all human needs.

Let his love flow out to others, let them feel a Father's care; that they too may know his welcome and his countless blessings share.

4 Church of God, elect and holy, be the people he intends; strong in faith and swift to answer each command your master sends: royal priests, fulfil your calling through your sacrifice and prayer; give your lives in joyful service sing his praise, his love declare.
